One of my highlights was this school community raising enough money to buy a house for a young family in Moldova. Our faith life at Trinity goes way beyond the school gates. Then there was the beautiful and inspiring Christingle Service in the chapel with our boarders and Trinity families.

A new initiative this year has been two of our pupils, Jero and Mackenzie, making a pilgrimage to Lourdes. There is always a risk in exploring something new but both boys made a huge difference to the lives of disabled and disadvantaged children and came back excited and energised by their experience. Plans are already in motion for next year's trip!

As in previous years, we have continued to develop flourishing links with our local community and both the Anglican and Catholic Dioceses. Messy Church at St Michael's was another highlight of the year, with even more local families attending this year, and more recently a day's visit by Bishop Sarah who spent time with staff and pupils enjoying and contributing to a wide variety of activities as well as answering challenging questions from all our students and staff!



As I look forward to next year, I find myself really excited about all the services and initiatives we have planned. It's going to be a year of celebration and reflection as we again journey through the times and seasons of the church calendar, a year of new plans such as our Palm Sunday and Trinity Sunday Family services, a year when our links to community and both Dioceses get stronger and stronger with the many opportunities this brings and a year for the whole school community to take a further step into the vibrant and diverse Christian life of Trinity.

Science



It has been a dramatic year for the Science Faculty following the launch of the Science Buskers. An idea built on the increasing collaboration between Prep and Senior Departments through STEM Science and Psychology clubs, the Buskers are a group of students from Years 4 to 13 who have been attending a club on Fridays, where they trial a range of fun experiments and then select those that can be best used to engage the public.

With ideas gleaned from the web, Year 6 and 7 visits to Plymouth University STEM Fair, together with contributions from the staff and sixth form involved, we now have a repertoire of activities to amaze and challenge people with. The Buskers themselves are given opportunities to develop a range of skills including leadership, responsibility and resilience; all the time sharing their passion for Science and Psychology.

Science Week 2017 saw the Buskers in action, with performances in Teignmouth town centre, Our Lady and St Patrick's Primary School, and Chudleigh Primary School, followed by a 'grand finale' at the Teignmouth Pavilions. All events were very well supported and created a real buzz about Science and Psychology. The contributions these events made to National Science and Engineering Week was recognised by the British Science Association who entered us into a national competition. As prize winners, we received a dry ice kit, which has been used to enrich the Busking experience both at school events and beyond.



Building on these successes, the Buskers took their roadshow to the Devon County Show where they entertained the many visitors to the Trinity School stand, and even performed at the Bandstand, the Show's musical hub. The word quickly spread and we soon had BBC Radio Devon visiting us to interview the Buskers on live radio as part of their coverage of the Show.

Busker demonstrations are becoming a regular feature at a range of events within our school community, such as the recent Open Day and the PTA Swim Barbecue. We are looking forward to building on our successes next academic year, with a number of ideas under consideration, such as inviting students from local primary schools to join our Buskers as part of a school partnership scheme - and the possibility of the Buskers representing Trinity at National Science events.

International & Performance Studies



Diversity and challenge are the hallmarks of our faculty. This year has seen the students step out of their comfort zones and brave new learning experiences in the broadest of senses. Working across Prep and Senior has allowed us to share good practice and develop our learners further. It does not matter whether it is making the first steps exploring a new language in Prep or interviewing regional business leaders, our students have challenged themselves on an exciting journey.

The range of experiences that pupils have had is breath-taking. There have been trips out of school enriching their learning, a favourite was the theatre visit to the Snow Queen in Bristol which formed the basis of subsequent studies. In addition there was the wonderful production of Snow White in Prep - truly spell binding, cross Key Stage trips to performance like Wonderland and our students performing in the external production of Macbeth in Torquay; all have enriched our faculty.

At the other end of the spectrum the Upper Sixth Business students experienced a day within the NHS supply chain bringing to life the challenges that face one of the largest organisations in the UK. The BTEC Travel and Tourism course has seen the students zig zag the South West of the UK working and visiting businesses in this sector.

The variation in style of course in our faculty means that it is accessible to all from Prep to Upper Sixth. The introduction of BTECs in many areas of the department has seen us harvest a phenomenal set of results with over 80% of students achieving Distinctions (A level A grade equivalent) scores.



Music lessons have benefitted from access to whole class sets of violins and African drums, allowing students to explore new aspects of music. The performance of students in assemblies and concerts have provided some of the highlights in the school year. To perform in front of any audience takes great courage and we have seen this in bucket loads this year. The journey to those performances has developed resilience and confidence that we see elsewhere in our faculty and department. Some of the digital production work in the Senior Department has been stellar, one of the highlights being Year 7's Garage Band compositions which show real ambition and technical craft.

Within the PE aspect of the faculty, we have seen the development of pupils' skills through technical development across all sports in lesson time, but also in inter-school matches where practice and dedication has paid off. Some of the Prep results have seen our students punch well above their weight. Both Senior and Prep sport are reviewed later in this edition.

Humanities

It's been a very busy and exciting year for the newly formed Humanities Faculty with plenty of opportunities for students to learn and develop their skills in a stimulating, creative and supportive environment.

The Humanities Day allowed our Year 4 to work with students from other local schools, taking part in 5 exciting workshops, each with a medieval theme and based on the mystery of The Stolen Pig. Other experiential approaches in Prep History lessons included the Battle of Bosworth re-enactment, making stone age weapons and Roman shields, and visiting Escot for a Living History day. The emphasis on learning while developing creative skills continued into the Senior Department. There were opportunities to make a Norman castle, to re-enact the key historical events being studied, or to welcome visiting **speakers all inspiring curiosity, providing challenge, and platforms for more in-depth analysis and understanding.**



Year 11 were delighted to welcome a visitor from former East Germany to aid their GCSE studies. Our 6th Form were challenged to a discussion about politics when our local MP Anne Marie Morris visited. In Geography, Year 3 pupils produced pieces of work that actually created rainfall and made earthquake-proof buildings out of a variety of building materials. Senior Department students participated in field trips to the River Lemon on Dartmoor and a residential trip to Chesil Beach in Dorset.

The Year 7 World Trade Game enabled students to have a better understanding of international world trade and show their competitive skills too! The English department led a range of activities in school for World Book Day and continued links in the local area with participation and awards in the Teignmouth Poetry Festival. Every child in the Prep Department performed in the Paignton Festival. We were delighted to welcome back Oliver Knapman, a former Trinitonian now working as a funeral director, to discuss issues of life and death with the Religious Studies 'A' level group. Former teacher and Trinity parent Hamish Erskine came to discuss missionary work with Year 9.

The Technology Faculty is made up of a fantastic team of teachers who this year have challenged their students across the age range. There have been some incredible examples of students surpassing their own expectations and achieving at the highest level from Year 1 to Upper Sixth.

IT and Computing have formed the back bone of the school's cyber safety work and students have engaged positively and reflected on their own risk management on line. This starts in Prep and continues through the rest of the school, including staff who need to stay abreast of latest developments and trends. This support has also extended to parental workshops to help them understand the risks their children are dealing with. The e-safety section of the Senior Voice has also been a way to share regular updates. Programming competitions and creative use of software to produce some really challenging outcomes has characterized the year.

Art has shone this year with it having taken a central role in the River Teign story project in the spring term – a project which reflected the passion and willingness of pupils to evolve their work through the younger key stages. The Art journey has continued in Prep with students studying and producing some amazing Native American pieces. In the Lower Sixth class the opportunity to share their talent and enthusiasm was embraced when the students supported an Art Impact session with Year 2 and 3 students from Shaldon Primary School.

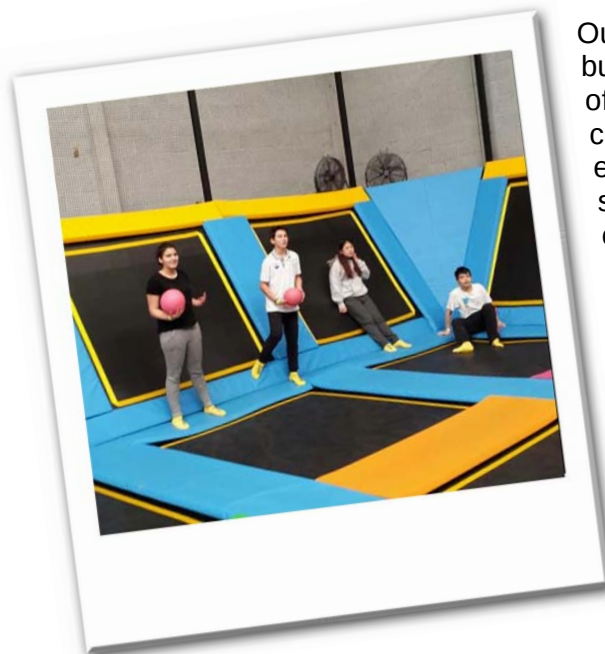


DT has produced a fantastic array of constructions, with the pinnacle being the Green Car Challenge. This has been a superb project showcasing Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths! This is our first year entering the competition, where students took part in a 90 minute race, changing drivers at least 3 times whilst trying to cover the most laps during the race. Next year we plan to take this project a step further and improve with a mark 2 type car. We will also be planning a trip to Williams F1 team headquarters and introducing an inter-house Green Car competition.

Success is often measured through grades and awards and the trophy cabinet is full this year! At the oldest age groups, BTEC success has been outstanding, with Distinction* and Distinction (A grade at A Level equivalent) being the norm. The combination of huge effort by students and careful nurturing by teachers, has helped these results be achieved. We have also seen success in ISA competitions as well as having our students' work exhibited in local galleries. Sean O'Farrell was identified by BTEC as an outstanding student, and was awarded a Silver certificate in recognition of his work.

Boarding





Our boarding family has been busy this year, building bonds of friendship and trust in a caring and friendly environment. From the very start of the year this process of personal and friendship development started with an activities day for all the boarding community. The combination of activities and house challenges brought our diverse boarding community together. The change was noticeable from the next day at breakfast.



Boarding has been a place where pupils are able to develop hobbies they already love doing alongside the opportunity to develop new skills with their fellow boarders. These activities have seen them mountain biking on Haldon, cycling up the Exe Estuary, letting off steam at iBounce (a real favourite) or finding the next Lewis Hamilton at the indoor Go Kart raceway.

The cultural events within the year have added to the boarding experience whether it be Christingle in chapel where our boarding and day families came together or Remembrance in Teignmouth, a sombre but inspiring occasion. Trips to very 'Devon' events like the Colour Rush and Brixham Pirate Festival have helped our boarders understand the culture of this wonderful area in which we live. Boarders' home cultural events were celebrated, including Oktoberfest and Chinese New Year which saw all the community getting involved. These events build the bonds of understanding and friendship between pupils from different backgrounds, show great pride in doing this. Religious festivals have also been embraced with boarders following Ramadam with the help of their House Parents and the school's catering team.

Evenings after study have become a time where boarders left of steam and relax in different ways. The outdoor basketball court has been a welcome addition to the menu in the warm summer evenings and the football pitch has seen fierce competition between the houses including the girls' house! The Food Tech room has been well used and respected, always immaculate for morning lessons and the smells drifting across the school site attracting friends to the hub of activity. Some of the boarders are even going to share their cooking skills in a club next term!

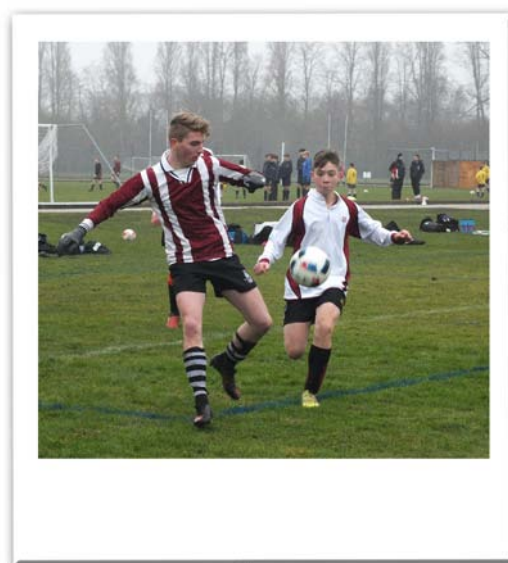
ISA Netball:

The U11 team highlighted the girls' efforts, with some outstanding play from Amélie Coen who worked tirelessly as Centre whilst Victoria Syms and Amélie Cassidy shone in the shooting circle. The U14 team did really well to come **second in the South West** winning some crunch matches to secure the result. The U16 team won their tournament and were crowned **South West Champions**; a great achievement and testament to their hard work and commitment over the years.



ISA 6 a side Football:

This was a new competition with both the U16 and U14 teams travelling to Nottingham University. The U16 team showed some outstanding football throughout the tournament, getting through to the **plate final**. Although we did not get the win in this very close match, there was some inspiring football shown from both teams, with the Trinity boys showing determination throughout.



ISA Swimming:

After a very successful South West ISA meet, 14 pupils made it through from the regional heats to the **National Final at the Olympic Pool in London**. This was a challenging event for all the Trinity competitors, but we came away with a number of medals: Fletcher Wickham - 2 silvers 1 bronze, Lucas Randall - 1 silver, Phoebe Armes - 3 golds. This was a great opportunity for our swimmers to experience swimming in a world class 50m pool.



ISA Cross Country:

Hosted by Trinity at Haldon Forest it was a great day with some inspiring performances. The U16 and U19 teams won their team event and we also had **17 pupils qualify for the National Finals**. Special mention has to go to the U9 team who had Max Cassidy 1st, James Hill 2nd and Fletcher Wickham 4th – almost a **Trinity whitewash**. Unfortunately the final was a victim of the British weather and was called off due to the conditions being so horrific in the Midlands. Chloe Jepson, in our Upper Sixth, deserves special mention for her years of service to ISA Cross Country.





ISA Rugby

In the Prep department we were **SW TAG Rugby champions** – a wonderful achievement. The U18 Rugby 7s team went to the National Finals at Twickenham (not the stadium!) where they performed better and better as the tournament went but failed to make the knockout stages.



ISA Triathlon:

A new addition to the sporting calendar and an event which we performed well in for our first go at triathlon. Fletcher Wickham came 5th in his age group, while course issues confused some of the other results - teething problems that we are sure will be ironed out for next time. Others who performed well were Benjamin Coen, Evie Lewis, Hannah Greenwood, Ben White and Starr Johnson.

ISA Athletics:

The SW regional competition was hosted at Exeter Arena, where we took 30 athletes to compete. There were some outstanding winning performances on the day from Jacob Evans - 400m, Beth Cooper - 1500m, Jon Arances - 200m, Benjamin Coen - Triple Jump, Barney Martin - High Jump, Ise Aworinde - 60m, Freddie Nicol - Long Jump, Max Cassidy - Cricket Ball and James Hill 600m. All 9 of these athletes were selected to **represent the South West at the ISA National Athletics Final** in Birmingham, where Ise won a bronze running in the U9 sprint, James won a silver in the 600m and 3 Trinity runners made up the SW sprint relay team.



ISA Tennis:

South West ISA tennis tournament was held on a beautiful sunny day in early spring where our top tennis players Beth Cooper, Emily Syms, Dan Mountford and Ben Ashfield had an extremely successful time, winning all of their matches dropping only a handful of games in the whole competition between them!

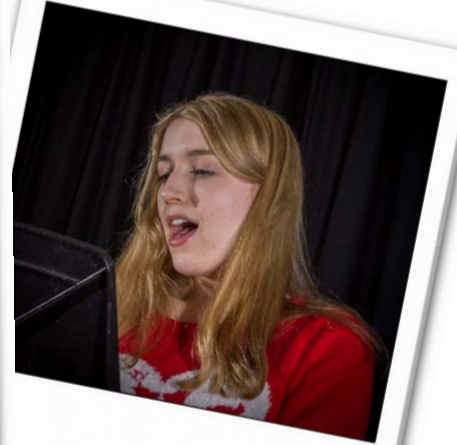

Speech Day

Guest Speaker - Charlie Martell - the 'Charitable Adventurer'

Charlie is an Ocean rower, former Royal Engineer Commando, adventurer, Fellow of the Royal Geographic Society and is dedicated to carrying out humanitarian work. He is currently working in Iraq running high-risk search and bomb disposal teams as part of the humanitarian stabilisation effort in the country.

Charlie attended Cheltenham College and Gordonstoun, before serving as a Royal Engineer Commando, trained in Explosive Ordnance Disposal. He has since put those same skills to use in the humanitarian sector. In January 2011, he was awarded an MA in Post-Conflict Resolution, from the University of York, followed by work in Afghanistan and with the United Nations in Nepal. He has spent years working in post-conflict situations in countries such as Angola, Georgia, Sudan, Nepal and Mozambique. His experience in these places and the response from the communities to the challenges such situations pose, provided his inspiration to go 'out there' and overcome his own adventurous challenges and in undertaking them: to inspire more people to push their personal limits; to overcome their own seemingly insurmountable difficulties; to inspire others to do more; to raise funds to help them reach their goals.

Charlie's first major expedition was as a member of the three-man 'Commando Joe' Team, who took part in the 2005 Polar Challenge ski-race to the North Pole, finishing the 320-mile journey in a time of 9 days, 3 hours and 17 minutes. The following year he rowed the North Atlantic Ocean in the boat Mount Spirit. The journey took 85 days and the team earned two Guinness World Records on completion. Together the two challenges raised more than £250,000 for the Meningitis Trust.

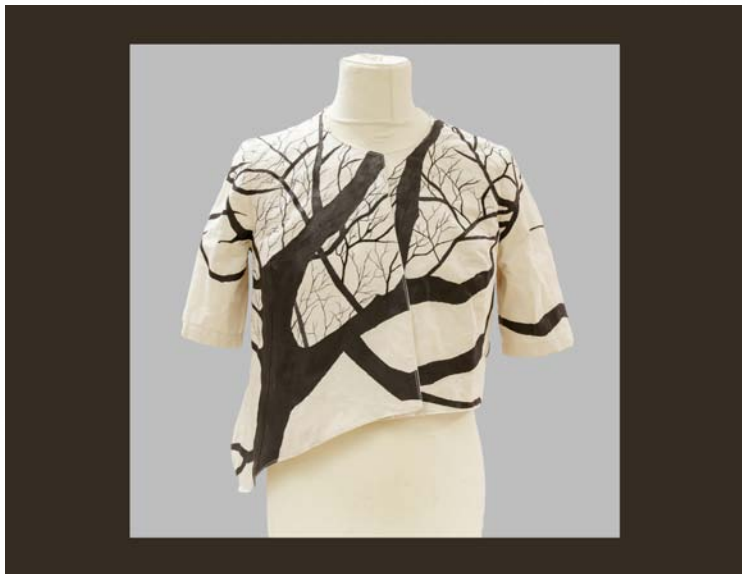

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Charity & Community



Charity is one of the pillars of our school motto and this year more than ever our community has embraced the excellent causes that we have raised money for. One of the highlights had to be our Moldova House challenge – we bought a home with the CR2EE charity to provide a safe place for families who are homeless until they can be homed. This was driven by Year 9 and it brought together all parts of our community and in 2 weeks we had raised over the £1200 needed to buy it – our 'House of Hope'.

There have been many events throughout the school to raise money but also awareness of issues. Our British Heart Foundation – Trinity Heartbeat project saw all students from Year 5 to Sixth Form trained in CPR – not only do we have a school of inspirations, but life savers too!



Within each department there have been causes championed by the pupils, and their energy and determination is infectious. In the Prep Department, the Christmas party was for UNICEF. In the Senior Department, money raised has been donated to Rowcroft Hospice by Key Stage 4 and the Sixth Form supported Help for Heroes and the Calabash Trust in South Africa.

On top of the more 'formal' events groups of students have put together their own events to raise funds for charities, the Heads of School in Senior put on the Summertime BTEC concert for Cancer Research and then finished the year with a Race for Life in the school grounds on the last Monday of the year. This last event shows the determination and the amazing approach with which Trinitonians see the world – they truly live our motto, **'Optimism, Confidence and Charity'**.

Student Leadership



“Leaders shape the future and managers make the plans work.” This quote captures some of the skills that we are trying to develop in our young people. This year we have seen our exposure to leadership opportunities grow and get younger and younger in the school. A student as a teacher, “Are you born a leader or does it develop through experience?” - a question fundamental to what we have tried to do.

In the Prep Department we see pupils leading in a range of ways, a recent interview with a Year 2 pupil revealed how another student guides others through maths tasks in lessons “because he is really good”. Pupils as young as Year 1 have acted as tour guides for prospective families, acting as very young ambassadors for Trinity. The Prep School Captains of School and the Year 5 & 6 students are often found leading activities with younger students. The Teddy Bears’ Picnic and Fairy Tale Forest events for the new Prep Lodge families demonstrated this wonderfully, Year 5 and 6 students leading the way engaging prospective parents and their children with real confidence and excellent inter-personal skills.

In the Senior Department this year, the role of Key Stage 3 Ambassadors was launched, every student had to complete an application for the role. This reflective task helped them identify their strengths and also where they might want to challenge themselves further. The students work closely with Mrs Davis to develop the skills they will need to lead their Key Stage. As a key entry point for new students joining Trinity, events are organised and students on tasters helped to settle into Trinity life.

The Envoys in Key Stage 4 have shown their true colours this year, leading tours with real aplomb and taking initiative with things that affect their Key Stage. Sometimes this might be working with Sixth Forms on the Winter Ball or raising a concern about an issue in the common room or around school. They have already shown their leadership in the Prep Department, as all parents who have been greeted at social events or organised at Parents' evenings will know! They carry the weight of responsibility for their areas of work with real pride, confidence and determination.



The School Prefects in the Sixth Form have been outstanding leaders this year and the example they set for our new Prefect Team will be hard to surpass. While on Dartmoor as part of their training the new Prefects were tested and challenged again and again. They dealt with failure, eviction and issues with confidence; communicating and problem solving their way to an effective solution. These aptitudes come from the example they see of those around and above them (and were sorely tested judging the Prep Easter Bonnet Parade!). A great deal of credit needs to be given to the current Heads of School Team, Alex, Katie and Sean (Deputy Head), who can be found in all parts of our school community. They have shown great logistical and management skills as well as showing themselves to be motivators and genuine inspirations to others. They have inspired a community to develop and better itself – they leave a genuine legacy in our school.

Combined Cadet Force



This has been another exciting year for CCF.

In the Autumn term a visit to the Survival Centre in Cornwall was challenging and fun.

In November thoughts turned to Remembrance. Trinity CCF provides the largest cohort of uniformed cadets for the Teignmouth Civic Parade at the War Memorial and Exeter Cathedral!

January brought new challenges away from home with a visit to HMS Raleigh where cadets learned ship firefighting and battled to stop the rush of water into HMS Chaos! Perseverance and team work were brought to the fore.

The most important improvement to military training has been the opening of the MoD Laser Range at Wyvern Barracks, Exeter. Managed by Capt Savill in his day job it has been booked almost every other Saturday since January for Trinity CCF so that cadets can gain confidence in weapon handling and range firing.



Leadership has been nurtured, and many Year 10 RN Cadets have passed the RN Junior Leadership course at HMS RALEIGH. Their increased confidence and sense of responsibility have been almost tangible within the Section and in their school life generally.

The Summer term saw the annual 15km Map and Compass Exercise on Dartmoor from Okehampton Battle Camp. Cadets planned their route on Friday evening and walked it on Saturday. They faced torrential rain and high winds that tested their resilience.

A highlight of the year has been the selection of Chief Petty Officer Cadet Connor Hare as one of the first CCF First Sea Lord Cadets. His Vesting Day took place in April on HMS VICTORY with Admiral Sir Philip Jones KCB ADC.

Cadet activities continue throughout the Summer holidays with three yachting expeditions and two national camps at HMS BRISTOL and BRNC Dartmouth.

River Teign Story



To mark World Book Day this year, the Prep Department set out on an ambitious adventure: to research, create and publish their own book. This project brought together every member of the Prep, from the youngest and newest child to the oldest teacher in a spirit of collaboration and creativity. It began with a story, a story written by Fi Darby and Trinity's own Lucy Atkins: 'Dart the River'.

On a blustery Monday morning, having listened to the story, Preps 3 and 4 embarked on a quest to locate the source of our own river, the Teign. Braving freezing temperatures and the occasional snow flurry, they travelled to Dartmoor and followed the Teign from its source to Step's Bridge in the Teign Valley. The following day, Preps 5 and 6 took up the gauntlet and travelled alongside the Teign down the valley, through Newton Abbot to the Passage House Hotel. Reception, Preps 1 and 2 then completed the river's journey down to the estuary at Teignmouth.

The children sketched the river at various points and gathered a bank of descriptive phrases to describe what they saw, heard and felt. On World Book Day itself, all of these memories and experiences were drawn together and the book 'Teign the River' came to life. The entire book: the words, the illustrations, the Ordnance Survey references, the blurb; all were the work of an amazing group of children who put their heart and soul into something that they will treasure forever.

Outdoor Adventure



2016/7 saw the launch of a number of new challenges away from the school grounds. The arrival of Mrs Atkins and the return of the Duke of Edinburgh scheme was quickly embraced by Year 9 and Year 10 who have already completed their Bronze expedition and are now working on the other elements of the award. The Gold D of E team have shown great leadership skills, managing the young Bronze challengers as well as passing their initial map and navigation assessment on Dartmoor in some very challenging hot conditions. This summer also sees the return of Trinitonians to South Africa with the Calabash Trust and Huckleberry Foundation in a project which brings together young people from a range of backgrounds across the UK. The focus of their work in the Addo will be to run a Winter Holiday School for in excess of 120 students which includes feeding them twice a day as well as delivering a range of classes. The main physical project is to install improved water storage tanks to keep the school open when the drought comes and the community is cut off by the local authorities. This promises to be a challenging experience on many different levels and will be life shaping for many of the participants.

In an evolution to our international work, we launched World Challenge in school with our first group heading to Morocco in July 2018. The students from Year 10, 11 and the Sixth Form will be faced with a range of challenges from trekking in the Atlas mountains, working in a remote community school, managing their own transport, food and accommodation once away from Marrakech. This trip promises to introduce students to Africa whilst at the same time bringing to life our school motto - 'confidence, optimism and charity'.

The National Citizen Service launched to Year 11 and the Lower Sixth in January and has seen a number of students taking advantage of this amazing opportunity. Supported by pledges across the main parties, students experience 3 phases of personal development. For £50 they receive over £1500 of experiences through the summer holiday, paid for by the government!

The success of Young Enterprise (YE) at Trinity School since it was introduced four years ago has been phenomenal. The inspiration of these previous ventures was more than evident this year and our Young Enterprise team was again a great success. 'BrainBlox' was the brainchild of Lower Sixth student Josh Trickett, who came up with the concept of creating jigsaw puzzles out of Lego. Again, good links were built with other departments at Trinity and the use of the laser-cutter in the Design and Technology Department was invaluable. This truly innovative project was much admired by entrepreneurs from across the county and Trinity School were again awarded with a county prize. 'BrainBlox' won the 'Best Company Report' award; the fourth year in a row that Trinity School has won this award.

YE has developed innovation, business acumen, leadership, responsibility, reflection and resilience as hallmark characteristics of our ambitious students.

Our independent entrepreneurs have grown throughout the years and so many great ideas have been created, but this would not have been possible without the great support of parent Malcolm Protheroe, who has inspired so many pupils along the way.

Clubs - World of Opportunities



Club provision has grown from strength to strength, with more opportunities available to pupils at the end of the school day. An exciting development has been the growth in cross phase clubs, not just the year groups next to each other but wider age ranges to encourage and strengthen the bonds within our community.

In the Senior Department, the extension of clubs to 5 days a week, inline with the Prep Department provision, has benefitted those who have embraced this opportunity. It has been great to see staff bringing their passion to school. Mrs Atkins arrived in January and had D of E up and running within a matter of weeks! Mr Larkman unleashed his secret Jedi knowledge with Star Wars club which was hugely popular.

Clubs have not been limited to the school site; students have been on the water, sailing and paddleboarding, skiing, playing golf or training up at the Hazledown Oval in the summer (when the weather allowed!).

Clubs are an opportunity to develop our young people in ways which challenge, inspire and develop new skills. The big question is how can I afford not to be doing them?

Residential Trips



If regular trips can help bring our learning to life, then the residential version bring energy and enthusiasm to our whole life. Across the school there is a huge range of these opportunities run for the pupils. Having come across the Year 2 pupils after their classroom sleep over, which for many was their first experience of sleeping away from family, you could see the very essence of why these trips are so important.

This year students from Prep 3 upwards have had residential trips in and around Devon and beyond, where they have been challenged and taken out of their comfort zones. They have excelled outside their usual daily experience and seem to have come back a foot taller, more confident and as a well knitted team. These experiences are not easy at times and overcoming the challenge of just going can be most important barrier for some.

As students move through their school career the sophistication of the skills that residential trips develop change and evolve. Great risks lead to great rewards, as students manage the challenges more confidently. Key Stage 3 trips to Skern Lodge and Widemouth Bay offer very different challenges to the participants; as pupils grow up, the challenges they face change too.



Towards the end of Key Stage 3 CCF, Duke of Edinburgh's Award, Ski Trips and other opportunities allow students to actively choose to push themselves to develop, whilst having fun in a broad range of environments.

In the Sixth Form, the boundaries and limitations are pushed back and students are leading their own development, deciding how they are going to develop themselves in their next adventure. Our Grass Roots Project with the Huckleberry Foundation and Calabash Trust takes students far from their comfort zone; working with people they don't know, in an environment alien to them, in communities with real poverty challenges. It is by saying 'yes' and grabbing opportunities we see our young people develop. World Challenge 2018 and the National Citizens Service (NCS) will offer another amazing developmental opportunities for our students.

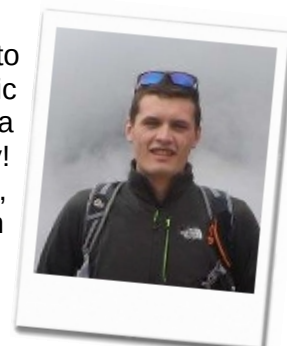
Jess Holding (2001 – 2015, Winner Mathematics Prize and Physics Prize 2015)

In September I spent two months teaching in a primary school, near Seim Reap, Cambodia, teaching across the curriculum. I then spent two months in Zambia right by Victoria Falls. Here I was carrying out community development work with some building projects: toilet and shower blocks for rural communities and a health clinic. Female empowerment work was a large part of my work: I coached an under 12s girl's rugby team; taught lessons on genre based violence etc (these girls really did believe it was ok for a man to beat them!) and an adult literacy programme (teaching adults who would walk two hours twice a week for my lesson on basic English). Zambia has 72 national languages so English is very important even to communicate with each other. I also worked on the medical home base care projects; this was the most demanding and heart wrenching experience I have ever had. Now I'm teaching hiking survival and rock climbing to boys aged 6-16 in the Berkshire mountains of Massachusetts I'm also a house parent for 20 boys. Ready for Nottingham University in September!



These are just a sample of biographies of what our Old Trinitonians are up to. One thing they all have in common is ambition, determination, resilience and Trinity values at their heart.
